However the club continued to blossom with 12 squeesey squares. We held big dances every time there was a fifth Saturday in the

month & that really boosted the clubs finances.

At that time we had a meeting room at the back of the stage, where Margaret Longmore, her belated husband Ray & her sister Joyce, looked after the small children & kept them amused. This was a really a great help.

We held approxiamately 50 dances in all, which was great financial means for the club.

We were awarded a plaque "Roll of Honour" from the Square-Dance Society of Old.

Unfortunately a number of dancers passed away & some were now unable to drive at night, so numbers started to drop.

It was then decided we should try to have them in the afternoons for a year. However this was not successful. So this was the end of a wonderful era.
